SUMMER READING CHALLENGE

1 in 5 children cannot read well by the age of 11. We're on a mission to change this!

We invite you to encourage your pupils to take part in the **Summer Reading Challenge** - the UK's biggest reading for pleasure programme for children aged 4 to 11.

Where?

The Challenge runs in the majority of UK **public libraries** and **online** at summerreadingchallenge.org.uk

When?

The Challenge begins in Scotland on Saturday 24 June and in England and Wales on Saturday 8 July and runs through the summer holidays. Variations apply in some areas, so please check start and end dates with your local library service.

The Summer Reading Challenge keeps my son's focus and it makes starting back at school in the new term much less stressful when he then has books to read everyday. It means he starts off in a much better position than when he has a gap of no reading.

What are the benefits for your pupils and your school?

The Summer Reading Challenge can:

- Help to prevent the summer reading 'dip' for pupils
- Ensure your pupils are ready for their return to school in the autumn
- Support the transition between year groups and key stages

For children taking part in 2022¹:

- 77% read more over the summer holidays
- 75% improved their reading skills
- 71% felt more confident about their reading









Each year, the Summer Reading Challenge has a new theme. This year, we've teamed up with the Youth Sport Trust to create 'Ready, Set, Read!', a Challenge that's all about sports and games.

Children will join our fictional team pictured below (and their animal mascots!) as they use their skills to weave their way through a summer obstacle course.

The Challenge will celebrate play and participation, encouraging children to engage in games and sports in any way that best suits them. It will showcase how reading can be active and engaged, and can itself involve teamwork and community.

Ready, Set, Read! is brought to life by children's writer and illustrator, **Loretta Schauer**.







How can children take part in the Challenge?

The Summer Reading Challenge is a flexible programme that is designed for all levels of ability.

At the library

- 1. A child will visit their local library and sign up to the Challenge for free. They receive their Ready, Set, Read! core pack folder.
- 2. They set a personal reading goal for the summer.
- 3. Borrow and read books, eBooks and audiobooks of their choice.
- They can read anything they like: fiction, fact books, poetry, joke books, picture books, graphic novels, audiobooks...
- 4. Collect special incentives from the library each time they finish a book.
- 5. Receive a certificate and/or medal* for taking part, or for reaching their Challenge goal.

In addition, libraries offer a wide variety of events and activities for families to enjoy throughout the summer.

Online

Alternatively, children can participate in the Challenge online.

- 1. Sign up at summerreadingchallenge.org.uk
- 2. Set a personal reading goal for the summer.
- Receive book recommendations and tips for accessing books for free at home.
- 3. Each time they finish a book, the child adds it to their online profile and leaves a review. They unlock digital badges and online rewards along the way.
- 4. Unlock a certificate for reaching their Challenge goal.

Children can also play games, enter competitions, share book recommendations and more on our free, safe, moderated platform.



The Summer Reading Challenge is open to all children aged 4-11. Some library services may also offer early years activities.

The 2023 Challenge launches on **Saturday 24th June** in Scotland, and on **Saturday 8th July** in England and Wales.**

^{*}Incentives vary depending on your local authority. Please check with your local library service to find out which incentives they are offering this year.
**Regional variations may apply, so check with your local library to find out when Summer Reading Challenge activity will start and end in your local area.



What can you do to support your pupils in taking part in the Challenge?

Introduce the theme into your classroom

The theme of this year's Challenge is sports and games. We want to celebrate play and participation, and encourage children to be active and engaged with reading.

- Engage pupils with the theme through sports and games-related activities in the classroom.
- Throughout the summer term, you'll find Ready, Set, Read! themed resources, along with links to resources from the Youth Sport Trust, at readingagency.org.uk/srcresources
- Choose books from the Ready, Set, Read! book collection to share with your class. You'll be
 able to view the book list at summerreadingchallenge.org.uk/readysetread-bc-landing
- Put up posters! Download A3 and A4 posters from readingagency.org.uk/srcresources

Celebrate your pupils' reading

- After the summer, encourage children to bring in their certificates, hold a special assembly, or congratulate completers in your school newsletter.
- Challenge your school to beat last year's total number of completers. Many library authorities
 offer trophies and prizes for the schools with the highest Challenge participation numbers!

Summer Reading Challenge

The Summer Reading Challenge takes place every summer holiday throughout the UK. Run by national charity The Reading Agency, and delivered with the support of the UK public library network, it is the UK's biggest free reading promotion for primary school aged children. The Challenge regularly reaches over 700,000 children each year, motivating children to keep reading during the summer and helping to build reading skills and confidence.

Chatterbooks


